Hostess Snoball Faith by Pastor Jim Fleming

Now the people became like those who complain of adversity in the hearing of the Lord; and when the Lord heard it, His anger was kindled, and the fire of the Lord burned among them and consumed some of the outskirts of the camp (Numbers 11:1).

Fresh out of high school for summer break, I came into the world of heavy construction to labor alongside a seasoned WWII vet named Merle. In his fifties, he had perfected a minimalist art. He knew when effort was required (rarely, by his reckoning), and when it was not. His years of experience taught him how to accomplish only what was necessary with the least expenditure of energy, husbanding his strength to lunch time when he would enjoy the Hostess Snoballs® June (his wife) packed in his lunch box every day! After this 30 minute respite, he would offer timely scraps of effort to "get through the day" and later return to June, dinner, and couch-side television.

Contrast Merle with the weight-lifter in training. For this athlete, doing the minimum is wasting the day. He thrives on exertion. He even welcomes pain. He knows that if he pushes himself to his maximum, even pressing past it, his day will not be wasted. His strength will grow and he will be better prepared for the challenges ahead.



This contrast has much in common with Israel's and God's differing views of adversity. When we arrive at Numbers 11:1, Israel is starting to look (and sound) a lot like Merle. They have been on the road with Moses for months (it feels like years). The menu has been boring—how many ways can you prepare manna anyway? What they wouldn't give for a Hostess Snoball®, or better yet, some roast beef! They were definitely NOT happy campers!

They did what we are all prone to docomplain. They complained because they were "Merlish Minimalists." They viewed adversity as an obstacle, something to be avoided. But saintsin-training view adversity through God's eyes. They recognize that God only allows a weight of adversity into the gymnasium of our lives when He knows we could use it to grow spiritual

strength. They see not an obstacle but an opportunity.

This explains God's anger with Israel. To complain about adversity is to imply that God either doesn't know what He is doing or doesn't have our best interests at heart. Israel's whining betrayed her perception that God is a problem.

If we do not trust God, we will respond to adversity by complaining. But if we see God as the perfect coach who only puts a challenge before us that He believes we're up to, a challenge that is going to grow strength in us that wasn't there before, then we can smile at adversity. Why settle for Hostess Snoball® living when we can become "heavy lifters" in the work of the Kingdom by trusting the perfect Coach? Smile, thank Him for the adversity, and show Him what you got!

It happens every year like clockwork, when daffodils emerge out of the ground and their buds bloom in full array, spring is around the corner! The daffodil is among the first to bloom ahead of spring, giving us hope that longer, warmer days are on the way!

The daffodil is one of my favorite flowers and has been since I was a kid. Growing up in the Puyallup valley of Washington State, there were many daffodil fields, and when in full bloom it was a sea of yellow, with Mount Rainier as a splendid backdrop! Many of those daffodils were cut and sold at plant stands along the roadsides. There was even an annual Daffodil Festival complete with a Daffodil Parade (including floats garnished with daffodils) that meandered through four nearby towns in honor of the marvelous flower! (Our own Rochelle Fleming was crowned a Daffodil Princess of her high school!)

The daffodil is one of my favorites because when I see them in full splendor, they remind me of a trumpet worshiping Creator God! The daffodil sprouts from a bulb, that was essentially dormant many months of the year, but around early December comes to life and by Christmas its first leaves are sprouting out of the ground. Then in February the bud stem stands tall and one day the flower opens triumphantly in tremendous yellow grandeur like a trumpet, yearning toward the sun and following it throughout the day!

This reminds me of <u>Psalm 96</u>, a chapter entitled, "Worship in the Splendor of Holiness," and what splendor there is in worship.

Psalm 96:11-12

¹¹Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice;

let the sea roar, and all that fills it; ¹²let the field exult, and everything

in it!

The daffodil is a remarkable plant. After hibernating for many months, it awakens to the unknown, warm and dry, cold and wet, and everything in between. I must admit, I doubted that our daffodil crop would have survived the single digit temperatures we encountered this year. But it is in fact a shot of cold temperature the daffodil



needs to awaken it out of hibernation! So, thankfully my fears were assuaged and assuredly, the daffodils came through in full bloom, leading me to write a short poem:

Daffodil Standing Tall Standing tall as a trumpet Following the sun The daffodil lives on

Here are a couple more tidbits about daffodils. After they bloom, the bulb stores up energy in preparation for its hibernation while spawning new bulbs for more flowers the following year. What a picture of evangelism! The daffodil stands tall trumpeting the sun and lives on!

Coming off the Global Missions Conference the daffodil is a great reminder that "All the Nations Shall Glorify Your Name!" We learned at the conference that worship leads missions and evangelism. May the daffodil remind you and me to worship, trumpeting Jesus and living on in him!

Stand and Pray—What the Post-Roe v. Wade America Needs From Our Church

Seventy five! That is the average number of cars in a week that visit an abortion center in Illinois. Most of them are from out of state.



Steven Yeo and I recently met with Sarah and Karen, two representatives with one of our church's local ministry partners, Memphis Coalition for Life (MCFL) to learn about their ministry in the post Roe v. Wade world. They explained to us that the battle is not over. Planned Parenthood is now sending women to Illinois for abortions. Once the mothers have traveled that far, they feel as if they've gone too far to consider alternative options. While abortion is illegal in Memphis, it is clear that Memphians are becoming more resolute in deciding to abort their babies.

MCFL's strategy is to reach mothers through their sidewalk ministry, never shouting, arguing, or showing graphic pictures. What they do is far from a protest. Instead, one person silently prays while a sidewalk counselor reaches out to Planned Parenthood abortion center visitors by providing medical and spiritual resources. These counselors pray with the women, share with them, and walk them to the pro-life center across the street.

This amazing work takes many faithful volunteers. And you can join the effort by participating in their 40 Days for Life campaign. Sign up for a 1-hour prayer shift to stand and pray by Choices. Sarah and Karen told us that the no show rate at abortion clinics can be as high as 70% when someone is present on the sidewalk. Your prayerful service will make an impact! May God bless the work of MCFL and First Evan's partnership with them.

OUTREACH

A Tool for Your Faith and Mission What happens to people who never heard about the gospel?

That's a good question. At first, it sounds like a question about God's moral character. If Jesus is the only way to heaven, how could God send people to hell who never got to hear the gospel? Isn't that unfair?

The question presumes that the hypothetical man in the remote jungle, island, or desert deserves heaven. In contrast, God claims that no one is good enough (Rm. 3:10-12). Jesus affirmed this by saying that God didn't send Him to condemn, but save the world (Jn. 3:17). In other words, Jesus is the doctor and not the disease.

According to the Bible,

- 1) Everything in the universe points to the Creator who created it. Yet we choose to worship the created things, including ourselves, rather than worship and thank God. (Rm. 1:18-21)
- 2) We were given a conscience, but we go against our sense of "ought to" and choose the wrong. (Eccl. 7:29; Rm. 2:14-16)

Not hearing the gospel doesn't send people to hell; their sinful choices do.

The question also presumes that hearing the gospel automatically promises heaven. This is also false. Salvation requires a person to repent, believe, and confess that Jesus is Lord and Savior. Unfortunately, most choose to reject Him. But hope is not lost.

The Bible says that God appoints when and where a person will live. They are to seek after Him from there (Acts 17:26-27). God does not abandon an earnest seeker. He will make a way. Cornelius had Peter, and the Ethiopian eunuch had Philip (Acts 10, Acts 8:26-40). The history of global missions attests to God who reaches the unreached. Then it is also possible that God made it so that in a particular isolated location during a particular time in history lives some particular people who would never get to hear about the gospel but also would never have received Jesus even if they did.

Lastly, Jesus desires that everyone be saved, including the isolated man. Perhaps it starts with the skeptic you are discussing this question with.
